PUBLIC WELFARE RULES AND REGULATIONS NO. 4

STANDARDS OF ASSISTANCE

WHE EAS, Section 9102 (a) of Chapter 2, Title X, Government Code of Guam, authorizes the Director of Public Health and Welfare to administer public assistance and child welfare services in Guam, and in accord therewith to adopt such rules and regulations subject to the approval of the Governor, as may be necessary or desirable;

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the foregoing, the attached rules and regulations entitled "Public Welfare Rules and Regulations No. 4, Standards of Assistance" are hereby approved and promulgated by executive order, and shall be in force and effect from 12:01 a.m., February 1, 1966. All prior rules and regulations are superseded by this order and shall be of no further force or effect.

PUBLIC WELFARE RULES AND REGULATIONS NO.4

STANDARDS OF ASSISTANCE

- 1. <u>PURPOSE</u>. The purpose of these rules and regulations is to set up standards of assistance in connection with the administration of public welfare under Chapter 2, Title X, Government Code of Guam.
- 2. <u>DEFINITION OF STANDARDS OF ASSISTANCE</u>. "Standards of Assistance" means the minimum quantity, quality, or costs of food, clothing, utilities, household supplies, personal needs, and special items which are considered necessary to and adequate for the maintenance of a minimum standard of living. It means the allowance, or allowances, expressed in monetary value as provided by Section 3.
- 3. STANDARDS OF ASSISTANCE. Standards of assistance are hereby established for budgetary purposes:
- .Ol. <u>Basic Individual Requirements</u>. These consist of necessities common to all individuals, and if not otherwise provided, must be included in the budget when needed by the applicant or recipient.
 - A. <u>Food.</u> The following allowance shall be included in the budget if needed and not otherwise provided.

C. <u>Utilities</u>. The following allowance for the cost of utilities indicated shall be included in the budget if needed and not otherwise provided:

D. <u>Household Supplies:</u> Household supplies comprise those items which are necessary for the day-to-day maintenance of a household, such as soap, matches, starch, etc. The following allowance shall be included in the budget if needed and not otherwise provided:

E. Personal Needs: Every individual has expenses which are incidental to his personal care, such as hair cuts, combs, brushes, toothbrushes and toothpaste, etc. The following allowance shall be included in the budget if needed and not otherwise provided:

- .02 <u>Special Needs</u>. These consist of necessities which are not common to all individuals, but which may be required in special cases. Allowance will be included in the budget, or as specifically needed on an interim or one-time basis, for the items hereafter set forth under the circumstances specified when the need for the item has been definitely established and approved by the Director, and it cannot be supplied from sources other than public assistance:
 - A. Therapeutic Diet: The following allowance for special diet will be allowed only upon the written recommendation of competent medical authority:

B. <u>Laundry:</u> The following allowance will be included in the budget if a person is physically unable to do his own laundry or has no laundry facilities and no one to provide this service for him without charge:

- C. Moving Expenses: Not to exceed \$100.
- D. Expenses of Employment: Expenses of employment numerated below shall be included in the budget and allowance made therefore, only to the extent that there is income from employment to cover them:
- (1) Transportation at actual cost to and from work at the least expensive rate available and by the most practical means;

- (2) Lunches for the person employed regularly and full time when a lunch cannot be carried from home;
- (3) Additional personal incidentals and clothing in addition to the regular clothing allowance when necessary to the retention of regular employment and in order that the employed individual may be suitably clothed for work.
- (4) Any expenses of employment required to be excluded under may Federal participation program.
- E. Purchase, Replacement and Repairs of Household Furnishings and Equipment:

 Purchase, replacement or repair of essential household equipment may be allowed at reasonable cost when the following circumstances establish the necessity:
- (1) When articles are worn out;
- (2) When a loss which is not covered by insurance has occurred through fire, flood, typhoon, or other disaster;
- (3) When circumstances such as illness in the family necessities additional linen, bedding, or other items;
- (4) When the item is essential to the health or the well-being of a person of the family; and
- (5) When an item cannot be repaired or a new article cannot be obtained from other sources.
- F. Shelter Repair and Maintenance: Repair and maintenance of shelter may be allowed at reasonable cost when determined to be necessary:
- (1) To keep the property habitable;
- (2) To meet the requirements of law; and
- (3) For the health and safety of the family.
- G. Shelter Rental: Rent, excluding utilities, may be allowed, not to exceed the maximum shown on the following table:

Shelter shall be provided at the lowest rental available.

H. Restaurant Food Allowance: A restaurant food allowance according to the schedule following will be included in the budget only when a recipient has no facilities for the preparation of food or lacks the ability to cook his meals, has no one with whom he can take his meals, and no other less expensive type of living arrangement is practical or available. Lunch costs for school children are included under this provision.

4. <u>COMPUTING NET AMOUNT OF ASSISTANCE</u>. In determining the amount of assistance, the following policies are hereby established:

A. Cash Income

- 1. The first \$5.00 cash income per individual either earned or unearned may be disregarded each month in determining need and amount of payment for financial assistance including medical assistance.
- B. Earned income to be disregarded in addition to the first \$5.00 referred to above.
- 1. An amount of \$50.00 of earned income of an Aid to Families With Dependent Children and General Assistance child, shall be disregarded in determining need. However, the total amount of such earnings to be disregarded cannot exceed \$150.00 of the earnings of children in one family without having public assistance payments reduced.
- 2. An amount of \$50.00 of earned income of Aged and Disabled applicant or recipient of public assistance shall be disregarded in determining need and amount of financial assistance including medical assistance.
- C. Policies on disregarding cash income earned and unearned are in addition to amounts of Economic Opportunity Act earnings which are disregarded.

The disregarded income shall not be considered a resource in determining the need of any other individual applying for or receiving aid.
